

Governor's Transportation Safety Awards



The Governor's Transportation Safety Awards recognize individuals and/or organizations who have made contributions to transportation safety in Virginia. The awards recognize accomplishments in the public and private sector by individuals, state and local governments, federal agencies, the military, and businesses and organizations that promote transportation safety. The awards are open to any person or organization who performs an outstanding transportation safety activity or program during the previous calendar year. This program is sponsored by the Virginia Transportation Safety Board, comprised of citizens appointed by the Governor of Virginia.

Awards will be presented from nominations submitted in each category for special individual and/or group accomplishments, major projects and outstanding programs.

Rules

Eligibility: Any individual, organization, business or government agency is eligible. They must have made an outstanding effort to change the attitudes and behaviors of motorists leading to the reduction of injuries and fatalities associated with transportation in the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Time Frame: Activities and programs must have taken place during calendar year 2005. Entries must be postmarked no later than February 10, 2006. Mail entries to the Governor's Transportation Safety Awards, c/o Audrey Odum, Room 713, Post Office Box 27412, Richmond, Virginia 23269-0001.

Criteria for Selection: The awards selection will be made by the Virginia Transportation Safety Board. Entries will be judged on: impact on the community; use of volunteers and private sector resources; creativity; imagination; and, uniqueness.

Notification: Winners will be notified by March 31, 2006.

Presentation: Awards will be presented by the Virginia Transportation Safety Board in May 2006.

Award Categories and 2005 Award Winners

Lifetime Safety Achievement Award — Presented for lifetime achievement in the area of transportation safety. Awarded in 2005 to William H. Leighty.

W. Calvin Falwell/Major Kenneth Rowe Award for Aviation Safety — Presented for promoting air safety. Awarded in 2005 to Paul Werbin.

Employer Safety — Presented for employers who have taken the extra initiative to promote traffic safety and encourage their employees to practice safe driving behaviors. Awarded in 2005 to Naval Safety Center.

General Traffic Safety — Presented for outstanding efforts in educating citizens and changing attitudes and behavior regarding transportation safety. Individuals/organizations who show exemplary achievement in the design, development and/or implementation of engineering techniques that reduce crashes on Virginia's highways will also be considered for this award. Awarded in 2005 to Christiansburg Police Department.

Impaired Driving — Presented for encouraging the prevention of drunk and/or drugged driving. Awarded in 2005 to William T. McCollum.

Law Enforcement — Presented to law enforcement personnel who have shown extra initiative to promote and encourage safety in their community. Awarded in 2005 to Master Police Officer Gregory A. Deeds.

Legal — Presented to attorneys or judges who have actively supported safety issues thus strengthening existing laws and creating new laws. Awarded in 2005 to Charles S. Sharp.

Media — Presented to media representatives or a news outlet which has helped spread the word about traffic safety through fair and accurate reporting or programming. Awarded in 2005 to K92 Radio.

Edgar P. Layman, Jr. Award for Motor Carrier Safety — Presented for contributions in furthering the safety of the motor carrier industry through educational programs and activities. Awarded in 2005 to the Harrisonburg Police Department, Motor Carrier Unit.

Motorcycle Safety — Presented for persons educating motorists and motorcyclists about motorcycle safety. Awarded in 2005 to David Hepburn.

Occupant Protection — Presented for promoting and encouraging the use of safety belts and/or child safety seats through creative and innovative programs and activities. Awarded in 2005 to Sgt. Doug Childress.

E. Wallace Timmons Award for Pedestrian/Bicycle Safety — Presented for encouraging safe walking and bicycling. Awarded in 2005 to Alliance for Community Choice in Transportation.

Public Transportation Safety — Presented for contributions made in educating drivers and riders about safety on public transportation. Awarded in 2005 to Virginia Railway Express.

Pupil Transportation Safety — Presented for encouraging, educating and promoting safety in pupil transportation thus improving safety for drivers and riders. Not awarded in 2005.

Rail Safety — Presented for promoting safety on freight and/or passenger rail systems. Awarded in 2005 to Jeff A. Dodd.

Water Safety — Presented for contributions made in improving safety for swimmers, boaters and fisherman. Awarded in 2005 to James E. Crosby.

Youth Traffic Safety — Presented for persons or programs educating youth and spreading the message on the importance of youth traffic safety. Awarded in 2005 to Stafford Country Youth Driver Task Force.

Nomination Instructions

Complete the nomination form on the following page. Include with your nomination form the following information in no more than six pages:

1. A brief description of the program.
2. Background information on the program. Why did it occur and what made it unique? Include any relevant statistics on what problems existed and what you wanted to accomplish.
3. Outstanding elements and accomplishments in the program (e.g., number of persons trained).
4. Approximate number of people impacted by the activity or program (e.g., project provided 100 free rides during New Years; program reached 10,000 teens statewide).
5. Describe any public/private resources used to implement the program (e.g., services, materials and/or funds raised or donated).
6. Describe how volunteers were used in the program (e.g., project had 100 fire and rescue personnel volunteer to inspect child safety seats).
7. Submit the original and three copies of the completed nomination form and supporting documentation. Please do not send video tapes, CDs/diskettes or photographs.
